The Eiffel Tower grows in summer?!



The Lycée Français Buildings: Then and Now

Dear readers, have you ever wondered what our school was like before it was even a school? Have you ever wondered why the library has huge, tall walls and beautiful ceilings? Fear not, we interviewed the school librarian, Madame Gendras, to give us the scoop on the history of our beautiful school.

Lillian: So, has this building always been a French school?

Madame Gendras: Nope! It wasn't always the Lycée Français de Prague, you see, we are in an old chapel, (it is named Maria) why? Because in fact, there was a nunnery here for a long time, the order was "Saint Charles Borromée", we say in Czech the "Boromejky". The founder of this order, was actually a French lawyer, his name was Chauvenelle, and at the time he created this because he wanted to take care of the poor, the sick and especially, in 1651, people who were sick with the plague. If we look a long time later on, the street wasn't always called Drtinova street like today, Drtinova is the name of an opera singer. This street used to be called Husova Street, in fact the nuns had a convent that was higher up, under Petrin, and then on the site in 1869 there was a shoe factory and it was also transformed there into a convent. There they took care of feeding the young women who had no work. The sisters lent their help. Of course they also had religious education, and were fed. Basically the sisters took care of widows, poor girls, who could not earn a living.

Here (the library) was the private chapel of the sisters, that is to say that they sang in this chapel. There were paintings, statutes in corners that have disappeared.

L: And what happened to the buildings during the 20th Century?

Today it is of course the LFP. Yet it wasn't always like that...During the 50s, under communism, there was an intense persecution of people who practised their religions. The sisters were sent to the countryside, they were hardly nourished, they were prevented from praying, they were prevented from practising their religion, basically at that period of time most people wanted them to die.

L: What happened after that?

MG: Well, it became a police centre under communism (which we can still see, by the way, because there was a garage which is still here close to the school.) And at this police centre, they say they tortured people... when we rebuilt the Lycée we found iron tables and beds in the basement.

Still under communism later on the library became a sports hall. That's why they destroyed the ceiling and closed two openings here, which were large doors (*points to two built-in shelves, one at the entrance which holds the czech literature and to another one close to the end.*) They removed all the religious signs, for example here (*points to a blank wall*) there was a mosaic of armed men, very strong symbols of communism in fact. So they played sports. After the fall of communism in 1989, the order of Saint Charles of Borromée, the order of the sisters, recovered the building. I know for a fact, this was thanks to Mother Superior, that she didn't want to leave it to a company or a store... She wanted it to become something cultural or educational, and therefore France rented then bought this building, I believe circa 2010, et voilà.

L: Apparently there are rumours about certain catacombs or graveyards here, is that true?

MG: No, no, no, the only similar story possible is, or so the legend says, that Rudolf Slansky (the General Secretary of the Czechoslovak Communist Party) who was executed after a purge of leaders in the 'satellite' nations of the USSR in the 50s, could possibly have been held and tortured here, but we don't have any proof.

One more thing to add is, after the revolution, the state was responsible for the restoration and therefore all the decorations were repainted, the windows here were also changed to wood... and so it is protected by the French state. What does it mean? It means that we have no right here to transform this place. No question of putting plastic windows, you see? It is forbidden. Although when I was here by myself during the pandemic, I had this feeling that I wasn't here alone, that the ghost of the sisters was here with me, that the books fell by themselves. There are always sounds in the library since it was built for the acoustic of the nuns, the sisters singing as we mentioned before.

L: As you mentioned before, you can hear quite clearly the conversations going around the Library from here. Did you ever try to solve certain problems with acoustics or the noise in order to help the students concentrate?

MG: Yes, there's a resonance effect which is simply incredible; this one year, I had a student who liked music, he was of German nationality, he studied in the lycee, and in premiere they had to make a TPE, that's what it was called at the time, which stood for "travaux personnels encadrées" So basically he had to make a project, and his subject was "can we do something to solve the acoustics problems at the library". Therefore, he did calculations, because other than being a musicologist he was also a good mathematician, and so he worked on the acoustics of the room, and he found a solution so that it doesn't resonate. For the solution that he found, he brought a 3D presentation, he presented it in front of the jury, and got a good grade, along with mathematic, and physical calculations. He gave us a demonstration with the sound, and the solution was basically to put a thread. A thread out of all things, I find that quite genius, you really had to think a lot if you wanted to come to that.

L: Do you think you will change the library in the future in any way?

MG: That's a question for Madame Allatre. Today it works this way, it's worked like this since 2016, with either classes, or animations, or contests being held here. Though the pupils obviously still have to come to do their assignments, and as you've probably noticed due to the reconstruction there's a shortage of classrooms, and so quite often the pupils come here to do their work, as well as the professors. There are also cultural activities, the arrival of authors, conferences, and so on.

L: How many books are there in total?

MG: Wow! Oh I don't know! What I do know is that when you go onto the lfp website, you should go to the "espace reservee", and there you'll see "pronote", where you can find the catalogue of the library, and just like that, you'll find the whole library right here!

And so, from the youth novels, for example, there's around 900.

L: Is there any book you recommend to read from this library?

MG: No! You must read as many books as possible ! I have a student who did a Trivia about all the books in this Library, she answered correctly to most of the questions, by simply reading. It is extremely important for youngsters to read! Yes, there are students that I know for a fact hate reading, but trust me, in a couple of years they will pick up a book they like, and then won't be able to stop! I can't tell you how many times this has happened! Yet I also know that there are students like you and many others who read on a daily basis, and you must remember how important that is and not to stop, and also remember there is more than one genre, it doesn't always have to be novels, for example, instead people should try reading poetry or manga! Manga has been extremely popular lately, I try my best to keep it updated! Any more questions?

L: No, I think this is all, thank you very much for letting me interview you!

MG: Oh you are welcome, have a nice day.

By now you have probably read a lot of things about summer but we've got something else for a change. We`ll show you some of the cool cars that will come out next year and brace yourself, some of them are pretty crazy.

First of all our new favourite car, the 2023 Chevrolet Corvette Z06:

The 2023 Chevy Corvette Z06 is expected to elevate the iconic nameplate into territory occupied by exotics from **Ferrari** and **Lamborghini**. With the engine now located behind the driver, it already looks unlike any Z06 seen before. Not only is it considerably wider than the **regular Corvette Stingray**, it boasts bigger air intakes and a unique rear wing. Thanks to a



flat-plane crankshaft, the new Z06's naturally aspirated 5.5-liter V-8 also won't sound like any Vette that's come before. While it inherits the best amenities and technology from the Stingray, its performance and handling will be heightened and sharpened. **Chevy** switched to a mid-engine layout to make the C8 Corvette a supercar that most folks can afford, and the 2023 Corvette Z06 promises to embarrass more than a few people driving insanely expensive supercars when they meet at a racetrack.

<u>2023 Genesis G90</u> Genesis's most luxurious model—the **G90 sedan**—is getting a dramatic redesign for the 2023 model year that will bring it into the modern era. Exterior styling is inspired by the **G80 sedan** and **GV80 SUV** but with a few unique touches that symbolise the G90's place

at the top of the company's model hierarchy. **Genesis** says the brand's twin-turbo 3.5-liter V-6 will be under the hood as the standard powertrain. Rather than the 5.0-liter V-8 that's the upgraded engine in **the 2022 model**, a 420-hp version of the twin-turbo V-6 will be offered. That engine utilises a



supercharger to boost the output and also features a 48-volt hybrid system. The G90's interior has been redesigned to pamper occupants with a plethora of unexpected features, including an on-board fragrance diffuser, power-operated doors, an air purifier, and a UV-sterilisation chamber in the rear centre armrest.

<u>2023 Polestar 3</u> Described as an "aerodynamic performance electric SUV," the 2023 Polestar 3 will join the growing number of new electric automobiles with high aspirations. Although Polestar has only teased a single image of its newest model, its streamlined roofline, prominent

fenders, and dramatic wheel arches have us smitten. We're told it'll boast singleand dual-motor configurations as well as a cutting-edge infotainment system that'll presumably feature the next generation of the company's **current Android Automotive OS**. It'll be equipped with an array of active safety features, too, which will include **Volvo's lidar technology** that's



said to eventually enable full self-driving. We also know that the Polestar 3 will ride on a new EV platform when it begins global production sometime in 2023.

<u>2025 Aston Martin Vanquish</u> The 2023 Lotus Emira is the latest model from the legendary British automaker and the last to use an

internal combustion engine. That's right. Lotus is preparing for an all-electric future, as previewed by the Evija hypercar. But before bidding adieu to its traditions, the company will treat purists to one final gas-burning sports car. As the successor to the Evora GT, which is currently the only Lotus sold in the U.S., the Emira is more practical and offers active safety equipment for


the first time. While the entry-level example will have a turbo four with 360 horsepower, Lotus also offers a supercharged V-6 with 400 ponies and an available manual gearbox. That means the Emira competes with Porsche's **718 Cayman** and certain **911 variants**.

Unique places in the world

This glowy sea is located on an island in the Maldives called Vaadhoo Island. The sea glows due to bioluminescent plankton, which is a chemical reaction between luciferin (a molecule) and oxygen that takes place in an organism's body. The tunnel of love in Klevan, Ukraine, is a railroad from the industrial revolution which is no longer used (only rarely) but has not been removed. It was used to transport raw material to factories. The only wagons that take this road come

here really rarely and slowly, which keeps this area calm and the nature is not destroyed. As it's name suggests, it is a really famous and is a romantic area for lovers.

The Queen's Jubilee

This year, Her Majesty The Queen became the first British Monarch to celebrate a **Platinum Jubilee** after 70 years of service. After four intense and extremely busy days, The Queen of England has been celebrated in every way possible, with more than a half of a week full of parties, concerts, parades, lunches, exhibitions, and pageants. There have been 3,673 public events and 3,799 street parties or private events shared so far. Not only in Central London, where most of these festivities took place, but all

over England, hoards of people hit the streets, to celebrate their Queen. The celebrations took place from the **2nd to 5th of June**.

To start off with the first major day, on Thursday the 2nd of June, the **Queen's Birthday Parade**, also known as **Trooping the Colour**, took place in central London, watched by tens of thousands of people on big screens nearby, as well as many more watching from their homes. The parade contained the 1st Battalion, Irish Guards, and more than 1200 officers and soldiers, who put on a display of military

pageantry on Horse Guards Parade, together with hundreds of Army musicians and around 240 horses. This annual event has now marked the official birthday of the British Sovereign for over 260 years.



The **Platinum Jubilee Pageant** was held on Sunday, 5 June 2022 near Buckingham Palace, as part of Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Conceived and directed by David Zolkwer with Pageant Master, Adrian Evans, it featured over 10,000 people from across the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth combined street arts, music, puppets, carnival and costume to celebrate the Queen's reign, as well as honouring the collective service of people and communities across the United Kingdom.

It was composed of four Acts : Act 1: For Queen and Country

"For Queen and Country" was composed of a military parade with 1,750 people and 200 horses. To mark the beginning of the pageant, the bells of Westminster Abbey peeled as they did on the Queen's Coronation Day in 1953. There were also flyovers by the Red Arrows, who are an aerobatics unit of the Royal Air Force. Prince Louis made the front pages with his animated responses to the noise.



Act 2 : The Time of Our Lives

The Time of Our Lives showcased changes in culture, technology, music and fashion throughout the past seven decades from 1952 to 2022. Open-top double-decker buses were used to represent different decades of the Queen's reign, with TV personalities, musicians, chefs, sportspeople, designers, and artists taking part in the procession.

Act 3 : Let's Celebrate

The third act, Let's Celebrate, was composed of carnival floats and featured street theatre acts and urban dance from various performer groups.

Act 4 : Happy and Glorious

"Happy and Glorious" featured a performance of "Perfect" by Ed Sheeran as a tribute to the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh.Crowds gathered at the Victoria Memorial towards the end of the ceremony. The Queen, accompanied by the Prince of Wales, the Duchess of Cornwall, the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge, and Prince George, Princess Charlotte, and Prince Louis of Cambridge, appeared on the balcony of the Buckingham Palace for the finale of the pageant, and everyone sang the national anthem "God Save the Queen"

led by the London Community Gospel Choir and the Band of Her Majesty's Royal Marines. As the Royal Family left the balcony, the West End cast of *Mamma Mia!* performed "Dancing Queen".



The **third day** of the platinum jubilee celebrations continues with **BBC's Platinum Party at the Palace**, with a spectacular evening of entertainment. The concert at Buckingham

Palace features a glittering array of global stars and performers from the worlds of music and dance to celebrate 70 years of HM the Queen's reign. As darkness falls, stunning projections illuminate the palace during the performances.

The Queen lit the first of her Platinum Jubilee

beacons, sending a spark of light around the globe and heralding the start of celebrations throughout the Commonwealth. With the touch of her hand the head of state illuminated a globe and sent a river of light from her Windsor Castle home to Buckingham Palace, where the Duke of Cambridge watched as the **Tree of Trees** sculpture was bathed in light. Thousands of beacons were also lit across the UK and the Commonwealth to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The symbolic moment came at the end of the first day of the monarch's celebrations marking her 70-year milestone, and was something she "greatly enjoyed". The Queen, who is now only two years away from becoming the **longest-serving monarch in world history**, and has already celebrated **three major jubilees**, has said she was "humbled and deeply touched" by the Platinum Jubilee celebrations held across the UK. In a "thank you" letter after a concluding pageant in London, she said she remained committed to serving as monarch with the support of her family.
